- Many girls received harsh punishment.
- She also was able to be role model to all the other children in the reeducation center.
- In the reeducation center they were not to allowed to have personal items.

REEDUCATION CONT.

- Emma Arnold (Simone's mother) sent letters to her until she was arrested.
- Her Aunt Eugenie visited her many times and was even allowed to take her out of the reformatory.
- Simone had to cook, clean, sew, mend, and take care of a little child in Wessenberg.
- As a responsible child, Simone was able to go outside on many occasions.

AFTER THE WAR

- The group of witnesses grew from 35 to 60 even when under ban.
- Simone was picked up by a woman who claimed to be her mother.
- It really was her mother but her mother had many cuts on her face and was horribly skinny.
- Then they took the train home and found their home and town were not destroyed.
- Simone's aun't had came everyday waiting for them to come.
- Her father had not come home yet and was pronounced dead.

AFTER THE WAR CONT.

- Then one day her father came home all torn up crawling up their stairs.
- He had escaped the "lion".
- Even though they were all together it wasn't the same as before.
- At her family reunion none of them want to hear what Simone's parents went through.
- Simone was not a child anymore. In those two years she changed.
- She went to art school just like her father did.

SCHOOL

- Simone liked school very much.
- The kids at school did not like it when she would preach to them.
- She was expelled for not saying Heil Hitler.
- After this she attended a regular school, where she was to sit and listen to the class only.
- She was beat by her principal for not sorting trash because it would help the war efforts.
- She also was forced to stand in front of the whole school while the rest of the school said Heil Hitler.

THE "VITAMINS"

- The "vitamins" were code name for literature and publications.
- Simone on one occasion helped a man print the Watchtower in German form French.
- If they would have got caught, they would get in serious trouble.
- They made special pockets to hide their "vitamins" in their clothes.
- Simone and her mother had made a secret compartment to hide their Watchtower.

MOM

- She got married in 1956 to Max Liebster who was also a Holocaust survivor.
- Her husband died May 28, 2008.
- She is still one of Jehovah's Witnesses.
- She is in her 80s.
- Today she is currently living in France.
